ILLINOIS COUNCIL ON DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES: WHO WE ARE & WHAT WE DO

The Illinois Council on Developmental Disabilities (ICDD) was created under a federal mandate in 1974 as an amendment to the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act (DD Act) and is administered by the federal Administration of Developmental Disabilities.

Our mission is to help lead change in Illinois so all people with developmental disabilities exercise their right to equal opportunity and freedom ICDD works to promote the independence, productivity, integration, and inclusion of those with disabilities into the community, ensuring that those individuals with developmental disabilities have the same opportunities as others in the community.

Moreover, the purpose of ICDD is to ensure that people with developmental disabilities participate and be included in everyday life, and be able to choose the services and supports that best fit their needs. To accomplish this, ICDD makes investments in people and organizations that serve people with disabilities throughout the State of Illinois. The Council follows the federal definition of developmental disability, which is a severe, chronic disability of an individual that:

- is attributable to a mental or physical impairment or combination of mental and physical impairments;
- is manifested before the person attains age twenty two;
- is likely to continue indefinitely;
- results in substantial functional limitations in three or more of the following areas of major life activity: self-care, receptive and expressive language, learning, mobility, selfdirection, capacity for independent living and economic self-sufficiency; and
- reflects the individual's need for a combination and sequence of special, interdisciplinary, or generic services, individualized supports, or other forms of assistance that are of life long or extended duration and are individually planned and coordinated; except that such term, when applied to infants and young children means an individual from birth to age 9, inclusive, who has a substantial developmental delay or specific congenital or acquired condition may be considered to have a developmental disability without meeting three or more of the criteria described above if the individual, without services and supports, has a high probability of meeting those criteria later in life.

Every five years, the DD Council develops a state plan with goals and objectives to address new ways of improving the lives of lowans with developmental disabilities. Self-advocates, families, state agencies, providers, educators, and other stakeholders provide input into the development of the state plan.

GOAL 1: By September 30, 2026, a minimum of 1000 Individuals with developmental disabilities and their families knowledgeably advocate and take part in decisions that affect their lives, the lives of others, and/or systems.

Objective 1: By September 30, 2026, ICDD will strengthen a program for the direct funding of a State self-advocacy organization led by individuals with developmental disabilities; will support opportunities for individuals with developmental disabilities who are considered leaders to provide leadership training to individuals with developmental disabilities who may become leaders; and will support and expand participation of individuals with developmental disabilities in cross-disability and culturally diverse leadership coalitions.

Objective 2: By September 30, 2026, individuals with developmental disabilities, their families, and other stakeholders will increase their knowledge and access to coordinated, streamlined information about services and supports, and will increase opportunities to advocate for their priorities among accessible and effective service systems.

Objective 3: By September 30, 2026, in collaboration with community partners, ICDD will reduce service access barriers and decrease the disparity in available information for linguistically diverse communities (inclusive of but, not limited to: Spanish & Polish) and increase the cultural competency of the DD service delivery system by providing information in languages other than English to increase inclusion of linguistically diverse individuals with DD and their families in at least 3 aspects of the service delivery system.

GOAL 2: By September 30, 2026, support systems will be optimized to increase stakeholder capacity, improve employment systems, community housing options, and post-secondary outcomes for youth in transition (ages 14-26). There will be 3 identified issues impacted and support provided to racial or language minority communities in at least 3 disparate geographic locations.

Objective 1: By September 30, 2026, ICDD will promote participation of people with developmental disabilities in Employment First activities, increase stakeholder capacity, and advocate for legislative and policy changes to increase competitive integrated employment.

Objective 2: By September 30, 2026, through interagency collaboration, a minimum of one (1) systemic change will be achieved in the area of housing / community living resulting in increased access for people with developmental disabilities to housing of their choice.

Objective 3: By September 30, 2026, ICDD will address any unanticipated emerging needs (e.g., natural disasters, pandemics, etc.) for individuals with developmental disabilities and families.

Objective 4: By September 30, 2026, ICDD will assist/facilitate three (3) or more individualized, flexible, and/or responsive services and supports for individuals with developmental disabilities.

Objective 5: By September 30, 2026, ICDD collaborates with other state agencies, advocacy groups, and/ or researchers to improve state systems for individuals with developmental disabilities.

Objective 6: By September 30, 2026, ICDD, Equip for Equality (EFE) and the Institute on Disability and Human Development (IDHD) at the University of Illinois Chicago will facilitate at least one policy and/or programmatic initiative to increase successful post-secondary outcomes for transition age youth (ages 14-26) in the area of employment, post-secondary education, and/or post-secondary training, and independent living.

Objective 7: By September 30, 2026, ICDD will support at least three (3) regionally significant racial or language minority communities in at least three (3) disparate geographic locations in Illinois to enable people with developmental disabilities to access a life like any other by increasing their inclusion in educational systems and related social settings.

Synopsis	The Alliance will develop and empower self-advocates across the state in the areas of personal, statewide, and national self-advocacy. There will be a minimum of 30 actively advocating member groups, 20 individually supported Advocate Bureau members, and 8 self-advocates assuming leadership of The Alliance as paid staff. As a result of the work of The Alliance, there will be a broadened (geographic, LGBTQ+, transition-age) increase in self-advocate involvement and active participation in systems change advocacy through training of self-advocates, support of advisors and allies, communication of advocacy opportunities, and partnerships and inclusion in coalitions with disability and non-disability entities. Having a seat at the table where the decisions are being made and
	having a voice in the decisions affecting one's life and the lives of others provides for self-advocates to be part of the decision-making process and not simply be on the receiving end of decisions made by others. Having a seat and a voice will help equalize the power dynamics that currently exist between people with DD and systems that support them.

Synopsis

Ray Graham developed a health resume tool to facilitate people being better able to self-advocate for healthcare personalized to them. The document is in paper and electronic form, and an app has been developed. The Health Resume can be presented to a medical provider on each visit to ensure the most up to date medical information is used. All 250 Individuals served by Ray Graham have a Health Resume and were trained in its use.

The project made unanticipated systems impact. Edward-Elmhurst Hospital approved the health resume being included in its EPIC medical record system. EPIC is used by the majority of hospitals. Current work is development of an app interface compatible with the EPIC records system.

Systems change impacts:

- 1. Local hospital (Edward Elmhurst) became aware that practitioners such as ER docs need to be aware of both medical and communication needs of persons
- 2. Pictorial Health Resumes were developed for persons/families desiring those
- 3. Paper and pencil format is available for Health Resume
- 4. Fillable PDF is available
- 5. App is available for completing the Health Resume
- 5. HSMS, the State of Illinois required software for all CILA providers now has the same Health Resume available and populated with information from that data base
- 6. **[to be completed]** EPIC software can import the information from the Health Resume to the electronic file. This allows hospital doctors/nurses to have current health information available electronically

The Corporation for Supportive Housing (CSH) is providing a training, peer learning, and technical assistance (TA) program targeted to DD services providers that prepares them to successfully partner with, become, or amplify their roles as supportive housing developers.
	The program is divided into two parts, one focused on DD providers very new to the development process, and a second focused on providers who have experience with development already. Less experienced providers will receive a robust introduction to supportive housing and the development process, financing mechanisms, and key stakeholders/partners. More experienced providers will receive individualized TA to help them work through specific challenges and barriers. CSH hosted a peer learning session to provide a forum to share learnings and best practices. All provider participants will have opportunities to network and hear from key government stakeholders

Synopsis	Transportation is a significant barrier for people with developmental disabilities to fully participate in their community. This is especially true in areas outside of Chicago where public transportation is more limited.
	To address this barrier, ICDD has invested with New Star (Sertoma Star post- merger) to finish the development of the ridesharing SCOOT app (Stronger Community Opportunities through Organized Transportation). The application is approximately 90% complete. The Content Management System (CMS) is developed and has been tested. The CMS has a hierarchy of accounts for New Star, agency licensees, riders, and drivers. It has been approved by the Apple and Android app stores for free download. A licensee agreement has been drafted to allow other nonprofits to use it. Adjustments made to update the SCOOT app include updating the financial transaction component, adding visual mapping, and allowing for the addition of

	consumer and driver pictures. Application for drivers and marketing materials are currently being created and solicitation of drivers and marketing materials are being drafted.
	This project provides funding to test the SCOOT App as a transportation option for people associated with New Star with a database to track utilization. Sustainability plans will allow other nonprofits to be licensed for SCOOT to be used under their brand name and execute licensing agreements to allow for the expansion of SCOOT within Illinois and other states.
